Informing You For a Better You

Just add color

It is easier than you think to pick the healthiest fruits and veggies. Want a quick way to improve your health, try adding more adding more color to your diet in the form of fruits and vegetables. The rich saturated colors of nature's produce are exactly what make them good for you because they have the highest nutrient density.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, eating a wide array of colored fruit and vegetables packs a wide range of nutrients. Yellow foods such as corn, squash, yellow peppers, and oranges are a good source of vitamin A and C that boosts your body's ability to fight infections and heal wounds. Foods with a red, blue, or purple skin con-



tain anthocyanins, the pigments that give foods like blueberries their blue-purple color that can provide protection against cancer, improve brain function, and promote cardiovascular health. Other foods on the list would be grapes, eggplants, cherries, wines, and red onions. Red foods also get their color from lycopene, a carotenoid that has been linked to a reduced risk of cancer. Living a healthy life

You have more control than you think when it comes to whether you'll live a long, healthy life. Even if you don't know your family's medical history, there are steps you can take to improve your health and prevent disease.

In addition to being vigilant about health screenings, there's a host of things you can do to lower your overall risk for a variety of diseases. Follow a diet that includes some fish and plenty of fruits and vegetables, and that is lower in saturated fat. Consume plenty of fiber and healthy fats like olive oil in your diet. Get at least 30 minutes of aerobic exercise on most days of the week.

Another powerful weight loss tool is keeping a food journal. According to the National Weight Control Registry's ongoing research project, this has helped the majority of 3,000 people losing an average of 66 pounds keep it for five years.

Start off with simply with tracking a typical week's food intake. This allows you to get a handle on problem times or circumstances that make it difficult to eat healthy. Write down exactly when and where you ate, whom you were with and your mood while eating, include special categories you want to track, such as carbs, fat or fiber.

By tracking your eating patterns, it can help you make adjustments and understand your over indulgences and dietary needs better. Studies show that keeping track of what you eat, for even one day, can help you make changes in your diet. What do you have lose?

Just breath-

One of the best ways to deal with stress is also one of the simplest: deep breathing. Try it a couple of times every day. All you need to do is-

- J Lie down on a flat surface or sit in a chair
- J Place the other hand on your stomach, just above your navel. Place the other hand on your chest.
- J Slowly count to four and inhale through your nose. Try to make your stomach rise a little
- J Hold your breath for one second.
- J Slowly count to four while you exhale through your mouth. To control how fast you exhale, purse your lips as if you're going to whistle. Your stomach will slowly fall.
- J Repeat five to 10 times

Give it a try - you'll find that you'll be calmer and ready to take on the next challenge.

The right way to dispose of medication

If your medicine cabinet is filled with expired or unwanted medications, their safe disposal benefits everyone. The FDA offers these guidelines for proper disposal of medications.

- ✓ Don't flush prescription drugs down the toilet unless instructed by the drug label or patient instructions.
- ✓ If no instructions are given, throw the drugs in the household trash. First, remove medications from the original containers and mix them with an undesirable substance, such as used coffee grounds, kitty litter, cooking grease or dish soap. The medication will then be less appealing to children and pets and unrecognizable to people who may intentionally go through trash.
- Put drugs in a sealable bag, empty can or other container to prevent medication from leaking or breaking out of a garbage bag. You can also call your city or county government household trash and recycling service to see if a drug take-back program is available in your community. If you're still uncertain about proper disposal, talk to your pharmacist.



Moms needs care too

After giving birth, you may be extremely tired from feeding your baby often, hosting visitors and other post-labor experiences and circumstances. It's critical to prioritize your own mental and physical wellness, along with your baby's needs.

Besides the "baby blues", and more severe postpartum depression, watch for other possible post-birth symptoms and changes. These include sore muscles, bloodshot eyes or facial bruising from the hard work of labor. Difficulty with urination and bowel movements can also occur for several days after childbirth. Drink plenty of fluids and use stool softeners, if necessary.

Alternates Orientation session. Here is where the AAMA Speaker and Vice Speaker of the House go over the rules of the House of Delegates, voting process, and how to present a motion. This was the time to ask questions and clarify issues. Nebraska delegation met with the Speaker and Vice Speaker after the session to discuss the proper way to House approach the Delegates to withdraw the Bylaws proposals in the Delegates Packet. We were also given a pamphlet on "The ABC"s of Parliamentary Procedure".

The North and South Carolina State Societies present the annual CMA (AAMA) Knowledge Bowl with questions developed by the AAMA Certifying Board, of which our own Jan Frederick CMA (AAMA) and Linda Allensworth CMA (AAMA) are members. Nicole Dvorak, CMA (AAMA) of the Omaha Chapter, Nebraska Delegate. and First Time Attendee, graciously accepted the challenge to participate in the knowledge bowl!

The night ended with the Advisory Council of Presidents and Presidents-Elect. President Naegele presented a handout with tips for being a leader entitled "As a Leader Remember". There was also discussion on the Program Planners Tab on the AAMA website and an upcoming webinar on immunizations. It was reported the forms have been improved and approved for CEU speaker. Again long discussion was had regarding

decreased membership.

SUNDAY SEPTEMBER 9

The House of Delegates tried something new this year with check in using your membership card in order to be admitted to the HOD instead of actual Delegate/Alternate cards. For the most part this went ok; there are just a few bugs to work out for next year.

The House of Delegates was called to order by Speaker of the House Nina Watson. **CMA** (AAMA), CPC. The opened with Opening reflections. the Presentation of Colors, the National Anthem (sung by Jamie Lee, daughter of Lisa Lee, CMA (AAMA) a Trustee from Utah who did an awesome job!) and the Pledge of Allegiance. were a total of 128 voting delegates and 4 proxy votes after Missouri and Michigan asked to be seated in the house. Rules of the House were not read since they had been printed in the packet to be read by Delegates. The report of the Nominating Committee was read and nominations from the floor were opened. There were no nominations from the floor for officers and trustees. Nominations were opened for the Nominating Committee with 6 delegates nominated of whom 4 could be elected.

At the end of the House, the Nebraska delegation made the motion to withdraw the Bylaws proposals in the Delegates Packet, submitted by Nebraska. We asked for these to be withdrawn as our original intent is not the way AAMA had them worded. We were successful in having these withdrawn.

Candidates for office each gave a 2 minute speech and then there was a chance to "meet the candidate" where we could ask questions of the candidates.

The afternoon started with Resolutions. There were two proposed resolutions both of which sparked quite a bit of discussion.

Then we went into the Reports going through each report for clarification and questions. Again it was asked why the Delegates do not get the HOD minutes and discussion on the "canned" reports that really don't tell the story of what our elected Trustees do during the year. It was brought up that our AAMA representatives should send a report to the State President following their assignments.

Also found out that next year, the Spirit of Medical Assisting Award will be changed to AAMA Medical Assistant of the Year.

The Reference Hearings ended with the Bylaws, please see attached sheet of all Bylaws.

The House of Delegates reconvened at 7:30 pm. Credentials gave their report with voting power again at 132 total.

Both Resolutions were defeat-

ed. All Reports were accepted as presented in the packet.

Don Balasa, JD, MBA, Executive Director, Legal Counsel gave an overview of the recent article "AAMA Triumphs in CMS Medication Order Rule" in which CMS decided that credentialed medical assistants would be permitted to enter medication orders into the computerized provider order entry system. This, he states, is a major victory for the AAMA and the medical assisting profession. His article will appear in a future issue of CMA Today.

Usually at the House of Delegates, the site for the AAMA Conference to be held in two years is announced but it was not announced this year. It was announced at the House there were 643 attendees.




